"Love and the Law: Legal Support for Diverse Family Forms"

While the U.S. Supreme Court has extended equal treatment to same-sex marriage, other forms of relationships still face legal and social discrimination. I will explore the legal and social disadvantages experienced by polyamorists and by 'mere' friends, and argue that these are unjust. I argue that the state should support stable caring relationships in all their variety, through marriage-like law. However, I argue that providing access to caring relationships for elderly and invalid citizens is equally a matter of justice, and one requiring very different legal interventions.

Elizabeth Brake is an Associate Professor of Philosophy at Arizona State University. Her research is primarily in feminist ethics and political philosophy. She is the author of Minimizing Marriage, which won Honorable Mention for the 2014 APA Book Prize, and editor of After Marriage (both with Oxford University Press). She has held a Murphy Institute Fellowship at Tulane and a Canadian SSHRC Grant. She is currently working on a project on the state's role in disaster response.

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
