This presentation explores an early effort to integrate institutional Christianity in the United States through an examination of the African American intellectual and theologian, Howard Thurman (1899-1981) and the physical embodiment of his thought: The Church for the Fellowship of All Peoples. Founded in San Francisco in 1943 the Fellowship Church was the first interracial, interfaith, and intercultural church in the country. Derived from a larger dissertation project that focuses on key elements of Thurman's intellectual foundations, this talk examines his pragmatism -- specifically his embrace of pluralism and mysticism – and analyzes where it manifests in the Fellowship Church.
